Previously, he was the inaugural Director of Graduate Recruiting in the College of Engineering at

University of Michigan. Mike Founded and Manages ENGINE. ENGINE is the Engineering National Graduate Institutional Name Exchange. ENGINE, achieved it's 10th anniversary in Fall 2024, exchanging ~16,000 student records between 87 Colleges/Schools of Engineering and Computing to encourage Master's and Ph.D. enrollment. His successes with name exchanges among other graduate recruiting strategies have led to enrolling the most academic and diverse Ph.D. cohorts in College of Engineering history at both University of Florida and University of Michigan. Mike holds a Bachelor's degree from Boise State University in mathematics, secondary education and Master's coursework from University of Idaho in higher education administration.

Julie Collins serves as the Assistant Dean in the Office of Graduate Admissions and Financial Aid at Northwestern University's Medill School of Journalism, Media, Integrated Marketing Communications (Evanston/Chicago, Illinois). She has also worked in the graduate admissions and financial aid offices at the Kellogg School of Management (business) and the Chicago Financial Aid Office at Northwestern University. Before working in higher education, Julie worked in museum education at

Chicago's Field Museum of Natural History and Northwestern University's Block Museum. Julie holds degrees in Political Science (BA) and International Relations (MA) both from Western Illinois University, and Educational Leadership (Ph.D.) from DePaul University. The title of her dissertation is, Dissertation: Othermothering by African American Women in Higher Education at Predominantly White Institutions: How the Practice Affects Their Professional and Personal Lives. Which led her to pen the Op-Ed, Leading in Higher Education as an African American Woman during COVID-19 for Samuel DeWitt Proctor Institute for Leadership, Equity, and Justice. #### The 2025 Distinguished Award goes to Andrew Kim



Andrew Kim is the Director of Graduate Enrolment Services in the School of Graduate Studies at Memorial University in Canada and has over 21 years of experience in higher education administration. In his current role, Andrew oversees academic and student services for around 4,500 graduate students across five campuses at Memorial.

Andrew has been a NAGAP member since 2011. He founded NAGAP's Canadian chapter in 2012 and was the first chapter President from 2012 to 2014. This was

NAGAP's first international chapter. He served on the NAGAP board of directors from 2016 to 2022, initially as a director-at-large from 2016 to 2018 and he was then elected as treasurer for two terms from 2018 to 2022. He was reappointed as NAGAP treasurer in 2024. While on the NAGAP board, Andrew drafted NAGAP's internationalization plan in 2018 for 2018-2020 which included as outcomes recruiting more international members (including committee members), creating linkages with international professional associations (such as NAFSA and CAGS), enabling joint presentations and cross-conference participation with international partner associations, and integrating more IEM content in PDF offerings.

From 2015 to 2017, Andrew also served as director-at-large for the Canadian Association for Graduate Studies (CAGS). Andrew was the recipient of the AACRAO SEM Award of Excellence (2011), NAGAP Promotion of Excellence Award (2013), and CAGS/ETS Award for Excellence and Innovation in Enhancing the Graduate Student Experience (2010 and 2013). He has presented on GEM best practices at numerous higher education conferences in Canada and the US, including AACRAO, NACADA, ARUCC, and CAGS.
